This year's annual report celebrates the growth and possibility that come from meaningful experiences at Community Music School. CMS has offered high-quality personalized music education to Wake County youth for 28 years on a wide range of instruments including piano, guitar, drums, and violin. We reached a milestone during the 2021-2022 school year with 200 students enrolled in weekly instruction, and our summer programs expanded to serve more students than ever before.

Reaching more students strengthens our impact on Wake County students and families. As our students progress through lessons on instruments of their choice, they develop skills in reading and performing music – and more. They practice discipline, problemsolving, confidence, and planning skills, all guided by caring professional instructors with whom they share a love for making beautiful music.

Our strategy for serving more students includes:

High-quality instruction on a breadth of musical instruments across all genres. Our dedicated and mission-oriented faculty, who inspire students each week, make this possible. Community outreach to offer experiences with music and musicians. This year we were back to hosting inperson recitals, attending professional performances, and making school visits. Satellite programs to bring music instruction to the student, resolving a transportation barrier for some families. This year we piloted a program at Southeast Raleigh Community Learning Center and are looking to expand this approach in fast-growing areas of Wake County.

On behalf of the Board of Directors, thank you for believing with us that every child with a passion for music should have access to an affordable quality music education. 
Tom McGuire dedicated his life to philanthropy and the arts and CMS is proud to celebrate his legacy with this annual event.
